Also watch out for me throughout the book, as I will be popping up with some suggestions of how you can make the most of the time you spend reading this book together!


Have fun!

There are many ways of approaching this, for example reciting a settling down poem together before reading the book. Here is one example:

It's time to read this lovely book, many adventures we will find. So come along, let's have a look, let's go-it's reading time!



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


Kim and Sam went to the farm.

Discuss farms that your child may have visited, seen or heard about. What did they see? What could they hear?

"Quack! Quack!" said the ducks.

"Baa!" said the sheep.

Why not have some fun with animal noises!





"Oh no!" said Kim.

"We will get wet!"

Encourage your child to say, "pitter, patter" while tapping his/her fingers to make rain noises.

Ask your child some of these questions.

What do you think will happen next?


What will the children do?

If you have a copy of the Bible, show it to your child.

Farmer Jim will be telling the story of Noah, which can be found in the book of Genesis. If you want to read it for yourself, you can find it in Genesis chapter 6 - chapter 9 verse 17.



"The story is true," said Farmer Jim.

God made the world.

God made the people.

God loved the people.

The people did not love God.

They did not do what God said.

Discuss the difference between things that are true and things that are false. Can your child identify the true statements?

The sky is blue.

Bicycle wheels are square.
The sheep says, "Moo!"
The duck says, "Quack!"

Why not add your own statements and turn this into a fun game?

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They did wrong things.



God was sad.

God said, "It must stop!

Discuss with your child what made God sad. It was the people doing wrong things against God, who made them and loved them.

## Has your child ever seen a flood?

If you can, use the internet, television or other books to show your child what a flood is like and the damage that it can do. Explain that the flood mentioned in this story would cover all the world, not just one town or even one whole country!





It was a big boat.

The people said, "It is silly."

The people said, "Noah is silly!"

The people said, "There is no water!"

Noah said, "Listen to God."

The people said, "No!"

Explain to your child that Noah believed God, which is why he built an ark.



God said, "Noah, go into the ark.

Your family will go into the ark.

2 of all the animals will go into the ark."


Noah went into the ark.

In some cases God chose seven animals to go into the ark.

His family went into the ark.

The animals went into the ark.

Explain to your child that **Noah had a wife and three sons.** His sons were called Shem, Ham
and Japheth. Noah, his wife, his three sons and their
wives all went into the ark.



There were 2 lions,

2 great big dinosaurs,

2 elephants,

2 creepy crawly

spiders,

2 bears,

2 snakes, 2 teeny tiny ants

2 dogs,

and lots more.

2 monkeys,

Ask your child to name other animals which would have been on the ark.

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They were all in the ark.

God closed the door.



"It is raining," said Noah.





There was water over all the world.

Noah was safe in the ark.



His family were safe in the ark.

The animals were safe in the ark.



It rained for 40 days.



It rained for 40 nights.

It rained a lot.



Then the rain stopped.

Ask your child, "What do you think it would be like in the ark with all those animals?"

Show your child how to recreate the sound of rain with their hands, beginning with two fingered clapping for light rain, normal clapping for heavy rain and clapping hands on knees for very heavy rain. Voices and feet can be used to add thunder and lightning!





The ark stopped on a big mountain.

Noah opened the window.

He sent out a black bird called a raven.

It did not come back. He sent out a

white bird called a dove.

The white bird came back.

"It is still wet," said Noah. 



He sent out the white bird again.

It came back



with a leaf from a tree.

The dove came back
because it couldn't find
anywhere to land. When it
brought back the leaf, Noah
knew that the water was almost
gone and it would soon be
time to leave the ark.

"It will soon be dry," said Noah.

He sent out the white bird again.

The bird did not come back.

"It is dry!" said Noah.



God said, "Come out!"

They got out of the ark.

Noah said, "We are safe.

Thank you, God!"

Ask your child,
"how do you think
Noah and his family
felt when they left
the ark?"

What can you say "**Thank You**" to God for?


God said, "I will make a promise.
